A Look Back at What the Hinton Mills Team Did in September 2019



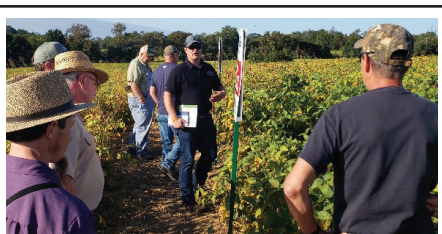

The Hinton family enjoyed supporting Ky. FFA at the 3rd annual Blue & Gold Gala.



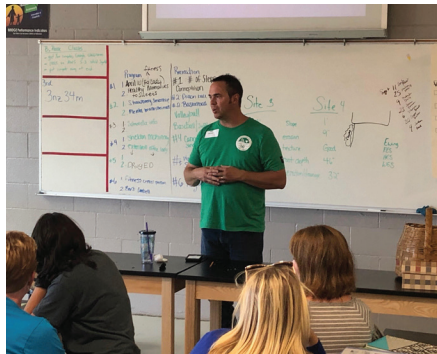
We hosted a Pioneer Field Day in the May's Lick Area.

Fifty Years of May's Lick Mill



Former May's Lick Mill manager Johnny Ruark shares his memories from his time with Hinton Mills

Johnny Ruark started with Hinton Mills in 1981 at Fleming County Farm Supply. He worked there with Ferman Perkins, and a couple of years later went to May's Lick Mill to become the assistant store manager. A couple of years after that, he was promoted to store manager.

"I really enjoyed May's Lick customers," he said. "They became my friends – they're still my friends. The people there accepted me – all the customers were great. At the time there were several young farmers in the area, and I really enjoyed working with them. I can remember when Jason Gifford got married, I remember when I hired Ron Lawrence. I remember when some of Bud's (Hinton) boys were born."

One of his memories from his time at Hinton Mills revolves around Ellora Hinton, mother of Frank O. Hinton, and the family's matriarch. She was born in 1890, and lived until she was 107.

"Mr. Hinton's mother (Ellora) was still living, and I went up there one time to help her. She had some dirt that needed to be moved. I shoveled the dirt into a wheelbarrow, and I was putting the shovel down. She picked up that wheelbarrow and started moving it. I said 'Oh - Mrs. Hinton - don't do that! Mr. Frank will fire me!' She just said, 'Don't you worry about that - I'll take

care of him!' She was just a super nice, Christian lady."

Eventually Johnny started his own excavation business, which he still runs.

"I've always had a lot of customers from May's Lick," he said. "A lot of my success is because of the customers I met while I was at May's Lick Mill."

"I think the world of Ferman Perkins, and all the Hintons were really good to me. I started when Mr. Hinton (Frank O.) was still in charge. Maurice Newman was the general manager at that time. They trusted me, stood behind me. They're good people, and I still think a lot of them today."
